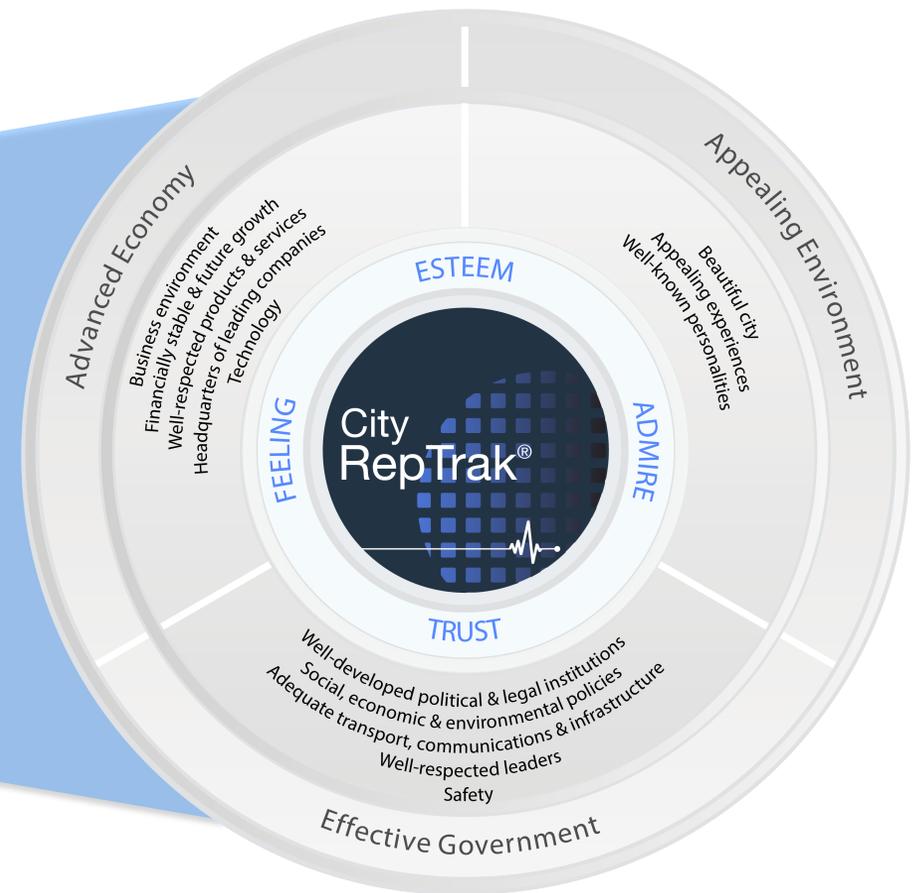

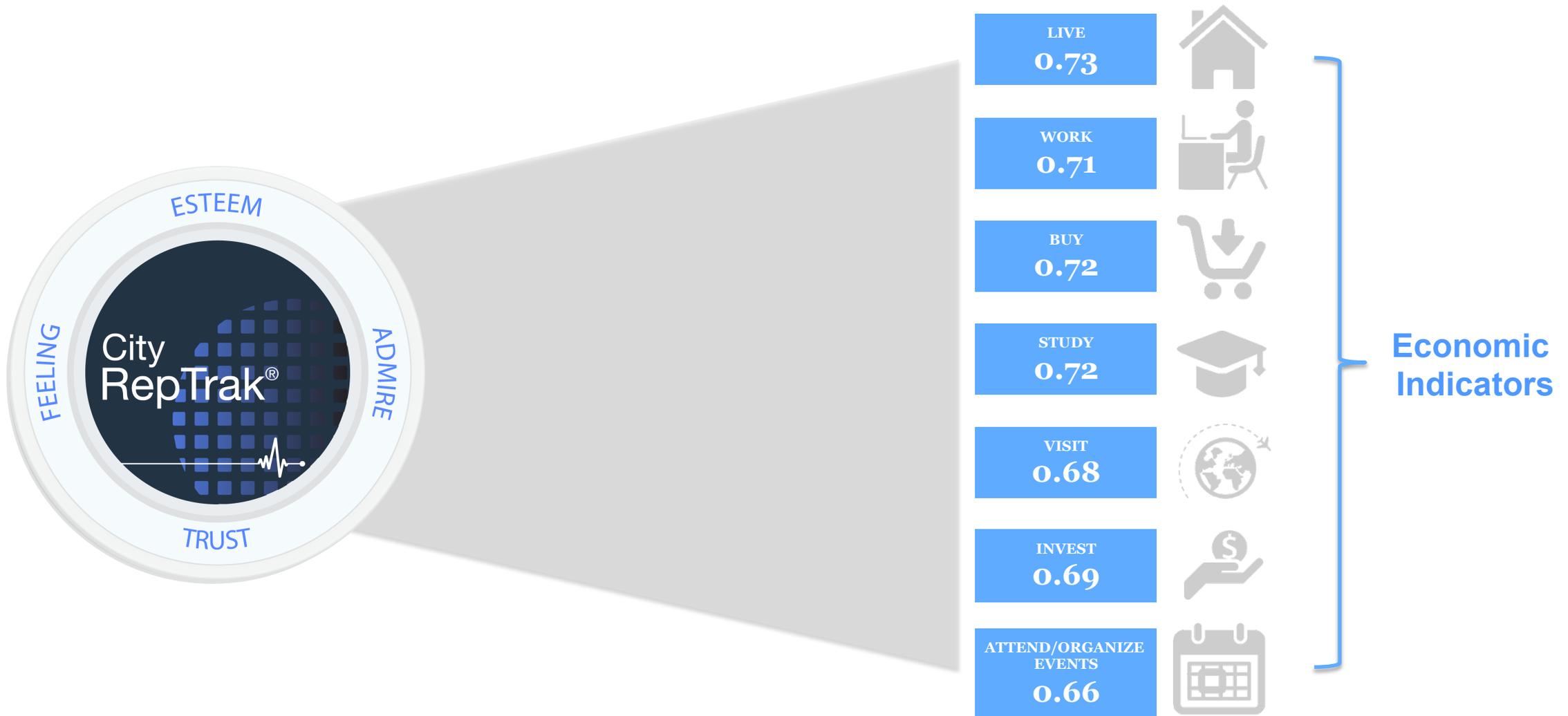

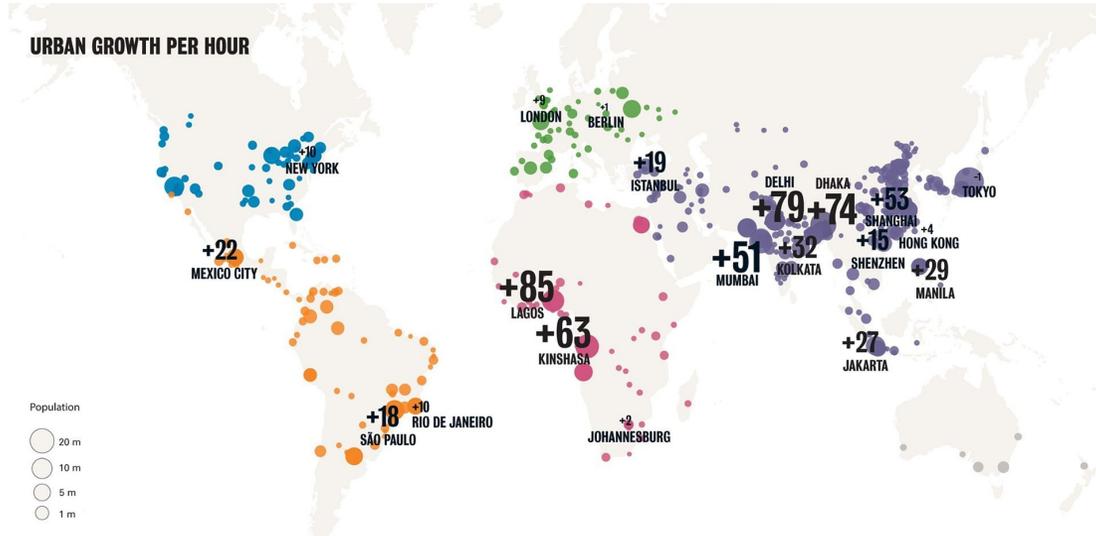
Criteria for City Selection:

City Reputation Trends*

Cities are the Economy's Backbone— and Highly Important



Urbanization is on the rise: the UN estimates that **2/3** of the world's population will be living in cities by 2050

According to McKinsey, city GDP will increase over **\$30 trillion** by 2025, accounting for **65%** of global growth

But in Times of Social and Political Disruption...

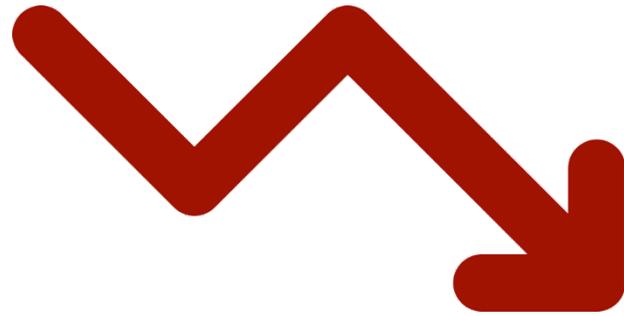


City reputation is compromised of more than just fiscal growth. Underlying feelings of geopolitical tension, nationalism, and social unrest contribute to city perception

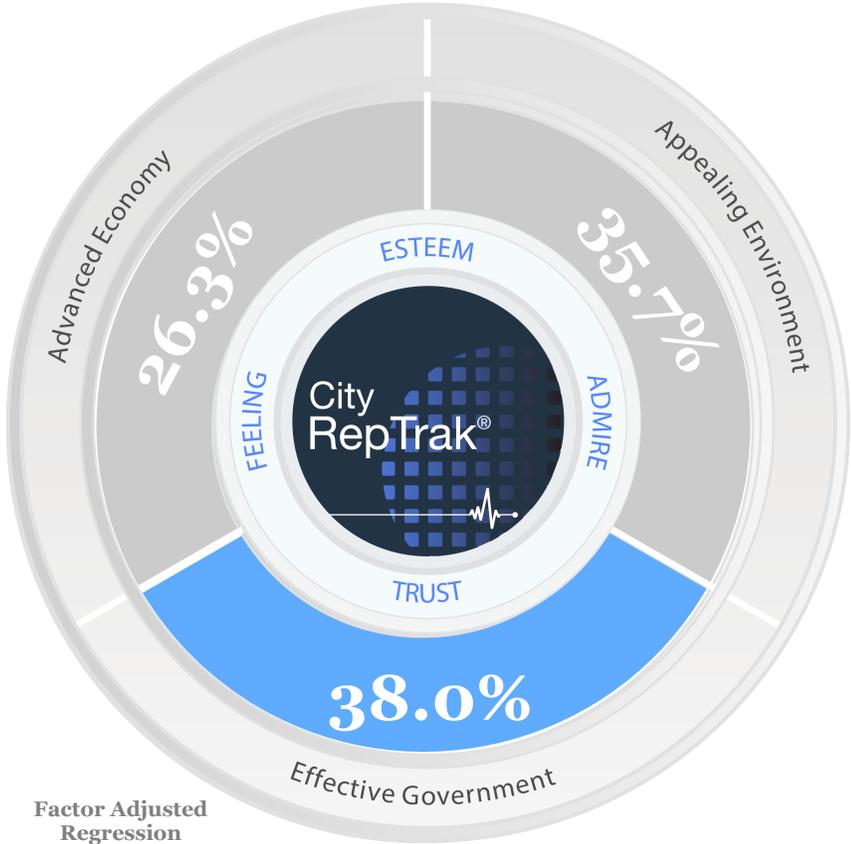

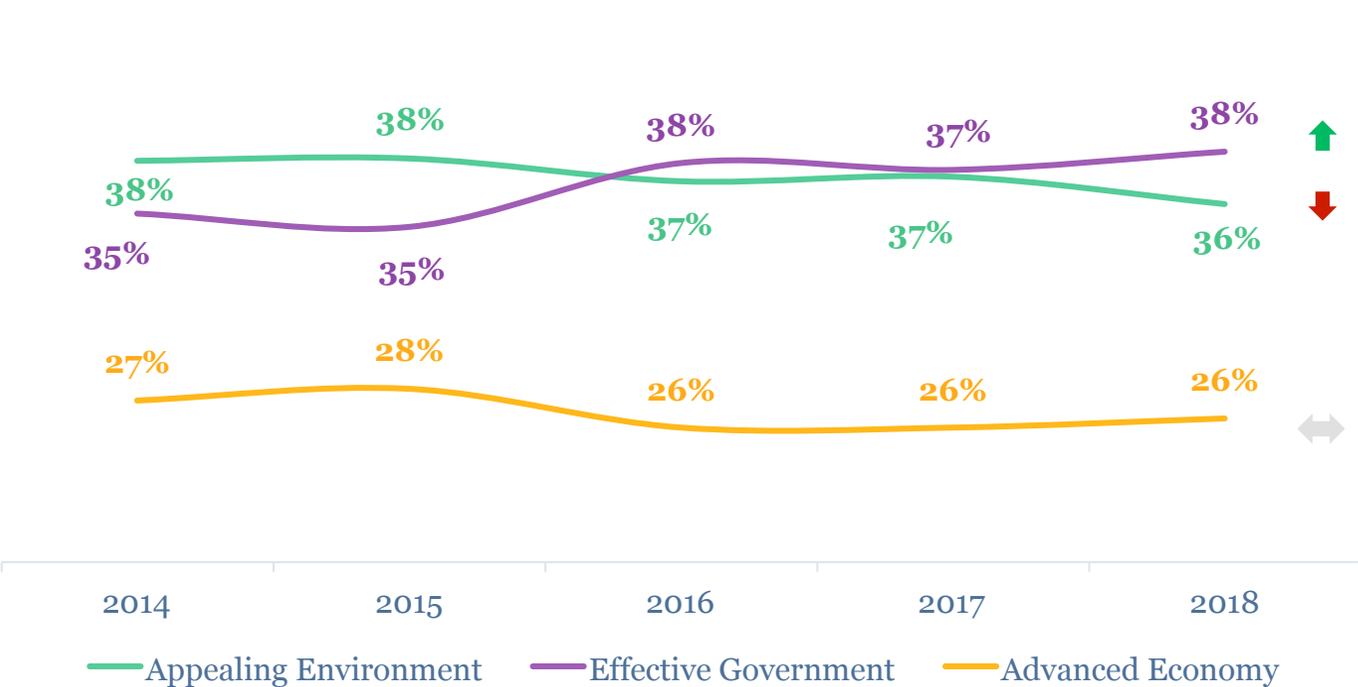

How to Become the Most Reputable City

1 Recognize What Drives City Reputation

Effective Government: Increasingly Important



City RepTrak Dimension Importance: 2014-2018



Effective government continues to surpass appealing environment as the key dimension driving city reputation

Promote Safety, Beauty, and Leadership to Drive Reputation

Most Important Attributes

- Offers a safe environment for visitors and residents: **12.2%**



-1.8 pts.

- Is a beautiful city: **11.9%**



-1.4 pts.

- Is run by respected leaders: **8.6%**



-3.2 pts.

The key attributes driving city reputation are safety, beauty and leadership, which together compromise **32.7%** of a city's reputation score

However, in 2018 there is an overall decline in each of these

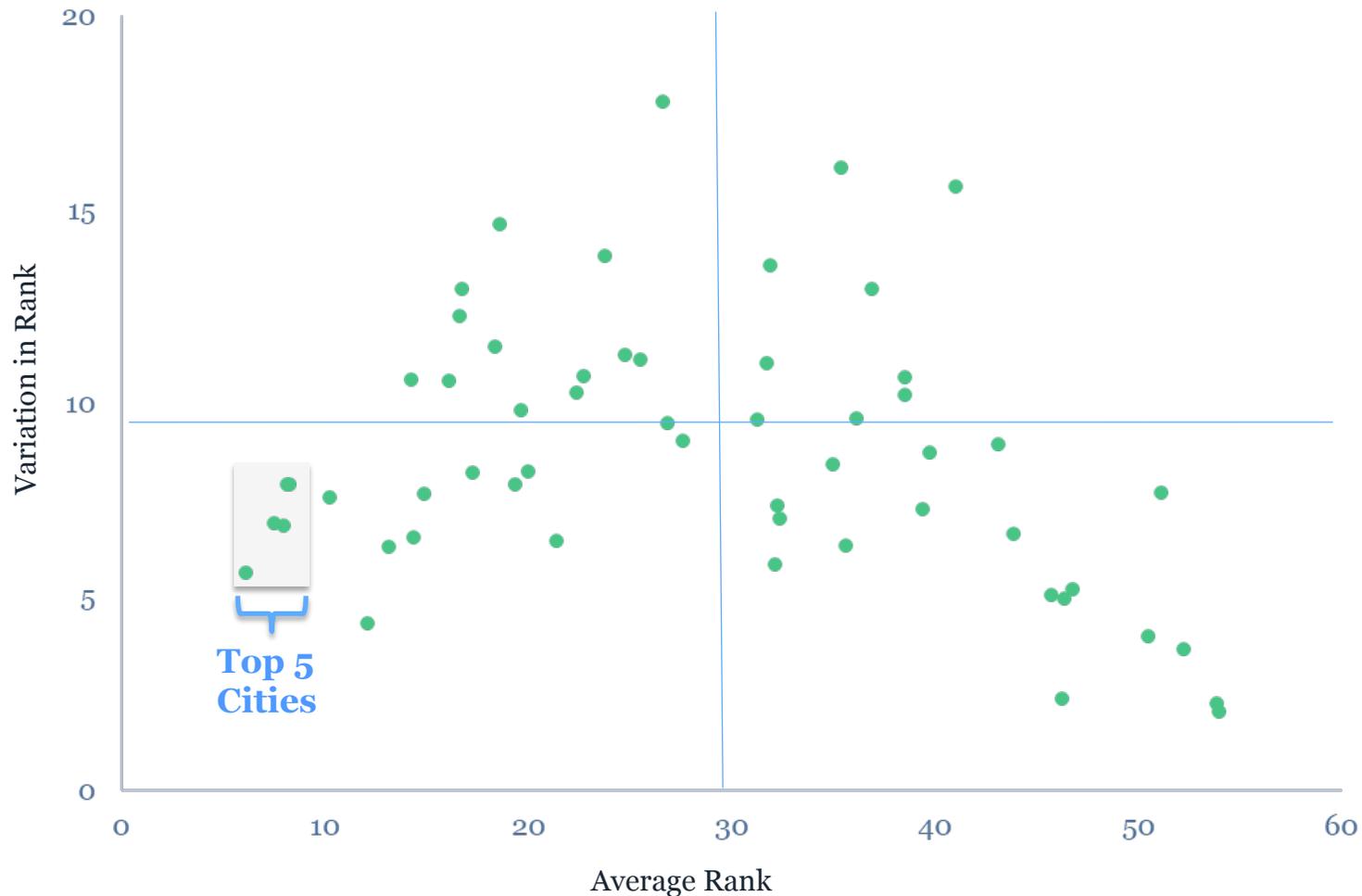
Safety Has Overtaken Beauty

This is the first time in 7 years that beauty declined in significance, being surpassed by safety as the premier attribute driving reputation.



2 Understand the Relationship Between City and Country

Consistency in Ranking is Hard to Achieve



Breakdown

- This graph shows the comparison of the variation from the average rank of a city between the G8 countries and the city's average rank among all G8 countries
- Strong-scoring cities with less variation between country rating outperform the rest– and is what other cities should aim for

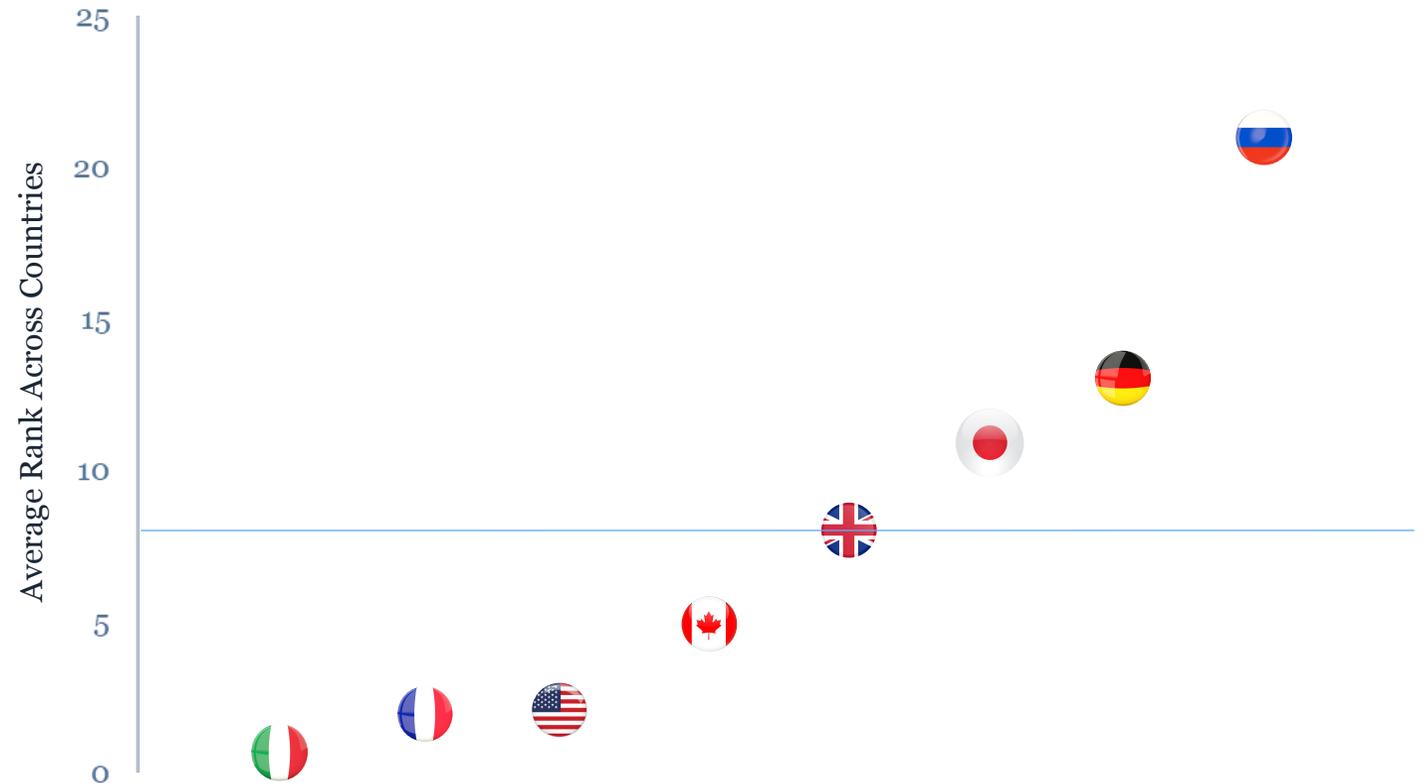
Even the Most Reputable City Struggles in Select Markets



#1 City Breakdown

- In some countries, the most reputable city ranks lower than others
- Specifically, Italy, France, USA, and Canada all rank the number one city within their top five most reputable cities
- However in Russia, Germany, and Japan, the number one city doesn't fall into the top ten

Most Reputable City Ranked by Country

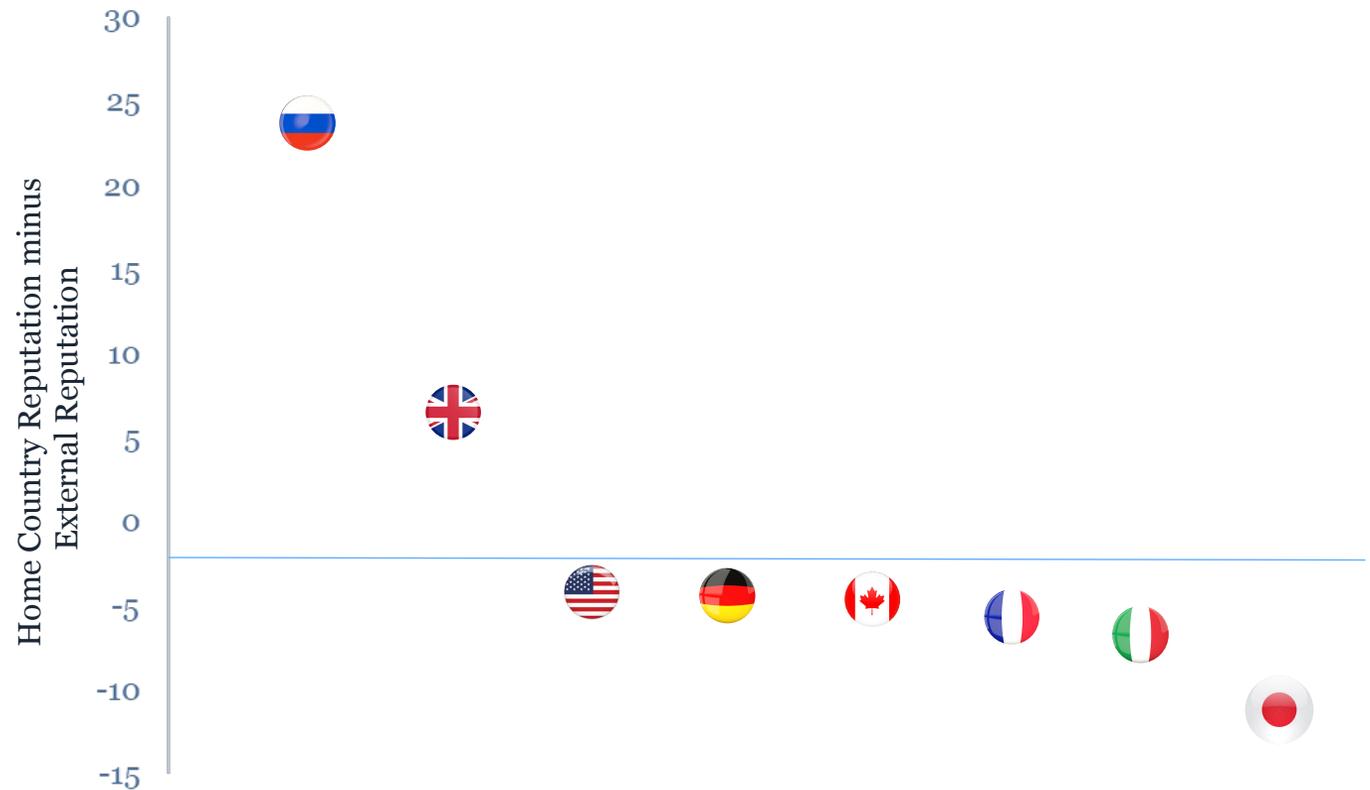


Home-Country Advantage: Not a Given

Breakdown

- For the majority of the G8, respondents from a country do not rate their cities more favorably than external cities
- Such countries include: Japan, Italy, France, Canada, Germany, and the USA, where respondents rate cities from their home-country on average between 5 and 10 points less than external cities
- However, in Russia and the UK, home-country respondents rate their cities higher than external cities– they view their cities better than the outside world does
- Especially Russia, who on average scores their cities +25 points higher than respondents from the rest of the G8

Align Your Emotional and
Rational Perception

Emotional vs. Rational Scores: Aim for Alignment

It is key to align and deliver on both rational and emotional levels.

The rational cognitive dimensions drive city reputation.

The emotional connection stakeholders have with your city drive positive economic factors such as tourism and development.

Does not deliver on reputation expectations

$$E > R$$

Tokyo: Most Reputable City



Tokyo rose 11 spots in the ranks to become the most reputable city in the world this year

Tokyo leads the way in key drivers of city reputation:

- #1 most respected leaders
- #1 effective government
- #2 in safe environment

Mexico City: Perceived as Least Safe City



According to the Mexico Daily News, this year Mexico City has recorded its most violent first quarter in the past two decades, with 382 intentional homicides between January 1 and the end of April 2018, which is 14% higher than in the first quarter of 2017 and 24% higher than the first quarter of 1998.

Rome: Benefits from Emotional Affinity

Rome's lead in emotional score over rational indicates the public feels more strongly about Rome than it thinks, which could give Rome an emotional buffer in a time of crisis. However, Rome's major gap between emotional and rational scores could be a sign of a reputation drop in the near future

New Delhi: Why It's the Fastest Falling City

New Delhi

New Delhi, the fourth least reputable city this year, fell the furthest of all city pulse scores since 2017, the reason being the following:

- Lowest scoring city for beauty
- Second lowest score for appealing environment
- Fastest falling score in: effective environment, safe environment, advanced economy, and adequate infrastructure

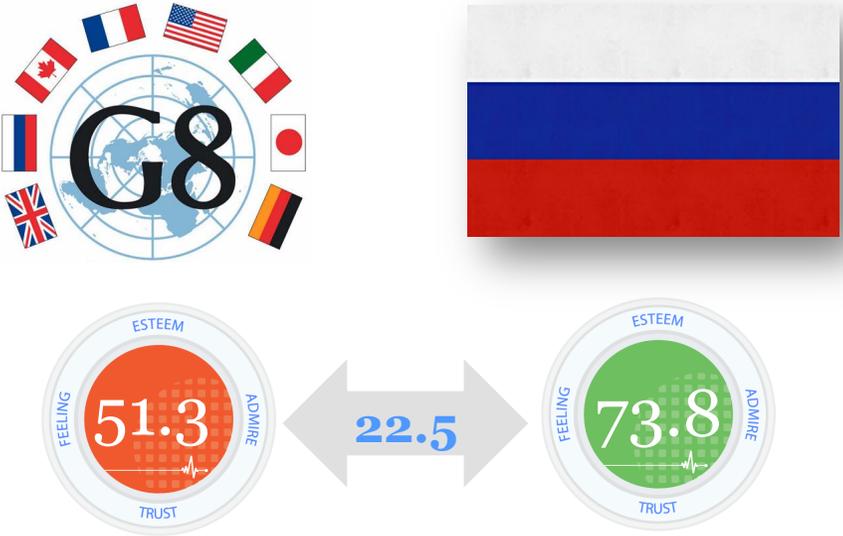

Moscow: Least Reputable City, but Strong Self-Image

Moscow Pulse Score: G8 vs. Russia



Moscow is this year's least reputable city, with a weak score of 51.3. However, Russians give Moscow an average strong rating of 73.8, which is **22.5 points higher** than the overall G8 score. Russians think highly of their own cities

As the overall G8 is declining in support for Moscow, **Russians are increasing their support**. The difference between G8 and Russian support for Moscow is huge— 42% for recommendation as a place to visit and 27% as recommendation as a place to live

Summary:

Key Learnings and Implications

City RepTrak®: Key Takeaways

1. Recognize what drives city reputation

- Fostering and developing an effective government is the most important priority for cities to attain a strong reputation foundation
- Cities must specifically promote safety, beauty, and leadership, which are the key attributes driving city reputation
- This year's pivotal switch between beauty and safety as the most important attribute is a sign of the current socio-political landscape shaping cities – stability and reassurance matter

2. Understand the relationship between city and country to identify pockets of opportunity

- Consistency in reputation is hard to achieve: even the most reputable city sees score variation between markets
- Don't assume your city has a home-country advantage: home countries are often most critical of their cities during reputation evaluation

3. Align your emotional and rational scores

- Cities must align their emotional and rational scores, which will bring them reputational equilibrium to increase reputation and overall appeal
